### "Kids helping kids"

As a culminating activity and to demonstrate their conflict management skills, the Peer Supporters presented a "conflict scene" to all students in their grade. Our team did a fantastic job of making sure all students know that their peers have the skills to help them solve certain conflicts.

Peer Supporters patrol our playground during lunch recesses and are available for Peer Support meetings on request at various other times. We have 2 Peer Support members in each class.

We are proud of their leadership and grateful for their commitment in helping other students talk through conflict situations and assisting in creating positive resolutions. The Peer Support program has been in existence at our school for over twenty years!

## Professional Development

### What were we doing on October 12th and October 26th PD Days?

We focused on setting goals to improve our practice and in supporting student success. The goal areas for the upcoming year are listed below:

### Focus Area One: Continuation of CRM Process on Aligned Calendar Fridays

- CRM Software- Full implementation for all CRM & Intervention Teams reflective of
   <u>ALL students</u>, with appropriate links to the APP/IPP documents for diverse students
   needs.
- **Maintain a Literacy focus** for CRM Discussions based on previous PAT data, ongoing STAR and F&P (diagnostic) data and teacher observations.
  - **Discuss and Share practices** around literacy resources to support student learning and achievement.

### Focus Area Two: Continuation of Literacy Focus for K-12

- **STAR Benchmarking** (minimum of twice a year fall/spring)
- Fountas & Pinnell Diagnostic Assessment (twice a year for K-3) and as needed for grades 4 to 6.
- **Literacy Interventions** included on Pyramid of Intervention for **all schools**. Formal literacy intervention structures focused across all four tiers. Utilization of literacy resources, LLI, LiPs, etc.

### Focus Area Three: Refinement of intervention processes and strategies

- **School-Based Pyramids of Intervention**-include literacy interventions and awareness of differences between: strategies, accommodations and interventions
- Intervention Teams for Tier 3 and 4 students with attendance by relevant teachers involved in programming. Meetings to be held on Aligned Calendar Fridays, <u>outside of CRM time</u>. Intervention Teams will determine intervention programming, evidenced through supporting documents: CRM, APP or IPP. Intervention Team meetings will utilize the CRM software for their meeting records.
- **Impact Assessments** completed by intervention teams, reviewed by ILS and connected to interventions in the CRM Software/APP/IPP, impacting teacher practice
- First Nations, Metis & Inuit Foundational Knowledge all teaching staff in Alberta will be responsible for developing and applying foundational knowledge about First Nations, Métis and Inuit for the benefit of all students. (New TQS and School Leader Standard requirements)

### **Teaching Digital Citizenship at ÉLUES**

What is digital citizenship? Digital Citizenship is defined as the norms of appropriate, responsible behavior with regard to technology use.

Digital Citizenship is more than just a teaching tool; it is a way to prepare students/ technology users for a society full of technology. Some would say that we don't need to teach Digital Citizenship, just teaches Citizenship as they are one in the same. Is it?

We feel that our students need to be specifically taught the language, the elements, and the awareness needed to be responsible citizens in this highly connected digital world.

Our students are learning to Communicate, Construct, Create and Collaborate using online digital technologies....even without our help. We need to support this learner by teaching them fundamental lessons in digital citizenship.

We have young minds operating in a highly connected world, yet they do not have a highly developed sense of risk and responsibility for this world. Our students need to understand that online choices have offline consequences.

### The Role of the Teacher

- ⇒ We need to look for ways to connect students globally.
- ⇒ We need to allow students to teach the teacher empower or students, let them help us understand their world.
- ⇒ Teach our students HOW to learn.
- ⇒ Teach our students to be Critical Thinkers



5 Tips for Teaching Students how to Research and Filter Information from the Worldwide Web

When we ask students to do research, where's the first place they look? The Internet, of course! Our students are busy searching and clicking, but are they really accessing useful information?

According to Australian teacher-blogger Kathleen Morris, students (and teachers) need to navigate:

- What search terms to put into Google or other search engines
- What search results to click on and read through (while avoiding inappropriate sites!)
- How to determine what information is credible
- How to process, synthesize, evaluate, and present the information
- How to back up research by combining multiple sources of information
   How to cite sources correctly



### CLOSURE OF SCHOOLS DUE TO INCLEMENT WEATHER

#### Administrative Directive

The Division takes precautions with respect to the welfare of students and staff coming to or going from school. When road or weather conditions jeopardize the safety of students and staff, schools will be closed and/or bus runs canceled. However, school closures and bus run cancellations will not always be made on a system-wide basis due to the large geographical area covered by the Division.

#### **Procedures**

- The following weather conditions will invoke cancellation of school bus runs:
  - 1.1 Air temperature in excess of -40 degrees Celsius regardless of wind conditions. In instances where the air temperature is between -30 degrees C and -40 degrees C, the wind chill factor may be considered if it creates a temperature in excess of -40 degrees C with the wind chill factor included.
  - 1.2 Dangerous road conditions and/or poor visibility (e.g. heavy snowfall, blowing snow, freezing rain, heavy fog).
- The decision to cancel bus runs and close schools is made by the Transportation Manager and Superintendent of Schools after appropriate information is gathered from each of the school areas.
  - 2.1 Bus drivers have the individual authority to cancel their route, or decide not to stop at a particular pick- up site if they feel the weather/road conditions warrant such action.
  - 2.2 In the event a bus driver decides not to run their route, or stop at a particular pick-up site, they will contact the dispatch office with the appropriate information. The dispatch offices will then contact parents on the route and inform them of the decision.
- 3. Once a decision is made to cancel bus runs/close schools due to inclement weather, the Transportation Manager shall contact the appropriate radio stations (Sunny 94.1 in Lacombe; Big 105.5 FM and CKGY 95.5 FM / ZED 98.9 FM in Red Deer; CHED 630 AM and CFCW 790 AM in Edmonton; and KJR 1440 AM in Wetaskiwin). It is to be noted that all such decisions will be announced on the radio. Since Central Alberta weather conditions are extremely unpredictable, families have a responsibility to listen for busing and school closure announcements when inclement weather conditions exist.

Wolf Creek Public Schools Administrative Procedures Manual

- After a decision is made to cancel bus runs/close schools due to inclement weather, the Superintendent of Schools or designate will initiate a fan-out communication to school administrators, central office staff, and the Board.
- 5. The decision to cancel all bus runs for a full day of school automatically includes the closing of the affected school(s) for all students. However, there may be occasions when the following occurs:
  - 5.1 Area bus runs (eg. Bluffton, Clive, etc) are canceled in the morning but schools remain open or
  - 5.2 Cases such as fog conditions and freezing rain, where road conditions are expected to improve significantly within a short period of time, but improvement in road conditions occurs too late to operate morning bus routes.

In such cases, schools will remain open, and the bus runs will be re-opened for operation in the afternoon in order to transport students home who found alternative modes of transport to school. Reminders that the afternoon bus runs will operate will always be announced on the radio immediately in the morning.

- When unexpected inclement weather conditions develop during the school day, buses will normally not run early. Instead, students will usually remain at school until the end of the school day, unless picked up by their parents. If it is decided to run buses early/close schools, announcements will be made on the radio.
- Staff is expected to make reasonable effort to be in attendance at the school during normal working hours. Should the weather improve or roads become passable during the morning, they are expected to put forth the same reasonable effort and journey to school.
